Following months of rigorous rehearsing during lunch hours, after school and weekends, four performances were staged to rapturous acclaim.



The Merchant of Venice



A group of 15 Able and Talented pupils were taken to the performance of a lively interpretation of William Shakespeare's tale of prejudice and revenge.

Pupils were involved in an interactive workshop beforehand where they became a 'Jerry Springer' style audience and then contestants on an 'open the box' type quiz show. This was an excellent introduction to Shakespeare's repertoire and has served to prepare them for next year's GCSE English Literature course.

During Black History Month UK, we remembered and celebrated important events in history and the people who contributed to a more equal and progressive society.

'The White Feather'

On 7th October the drama and history departments organised a day trip to the Dylan Thomas Theatre in Swansea to watch a play called 'White Feather'.

This production commemorated the beginning of World War One and helped to facilitate knowledge and understanding of this important historical event.

Told in their own inimitable style, Theatr na nóg mixed the harsh realities of warfare with moments of magic, incorporating the words of the First World War poets amongst others with beguiling Welsh folk music to tell a devastating tale of family, love and loss.

Afterwards pupils participated in a workshop in the National Waterfront Museum. This was designed to allow them to discover the true reality of living during the First World War. It was an inspirational day of learning for all.

Animal Aid also visited the school to discuss the ethics and issues of experimenting on animals. It was a challenging and thought-provoking session.
