
#### **PROM!**

#### **HOLOCAUST ASSEMBLY 2016**

Holocaust Memorial Day is commemorated every year on January 27th. This is the day when the UK remembers all those affected by the Holocaust, Nazi persecution and subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Bosnia, Rwanda and Darfur. All across the UK hundreds of thousands of people were marking HMD in 2016 in many public and private sectors. Cwmtawe Community School honoured Holocaust Memorial Day 2016 through daily presentations in morning registration and year group assemblies.

Through remembering acts of genocide like the Holocaust, pupils understood that unfortunately the world has not learnt from the Holocaust and realised the importance of not standing by and watching as genocide develops. However, pupils were presented a story of hope, the story of one man who spoke up when the genocides were taking place. The theme for this year's Holocaust Memorial Day was 'Don't stand by' and during each assembly pupils learned about Sir Nicholas Winton, who simply did not stand by. Throughout the presentation the choir created an emotional and reflective atmosphere, singing a medley of 'Footprints in the Sand' and 'Run' by Leona Lewis. Learners appreciated that while our community is one which is free from genocide, to prevent prejudice, persecution and injustice taking root, individuals must join as a community and not stand by!

## WATOTO CHILDREN'S CHOIR

On Friday 20th May the Watoto Children's Choir visited Cwmtawe school. The choir tours the world annually to advocate millions of African children currently orphaned by AIDS, poverty and war. The choir's Concerts of Hope are held across the globe.

Through the school CiCS club team, which is made up of members from the local churches, Cwmtawe was fortunate



to have Watoto visit our school. Year 7 and 8 were inspired as the children sang, danced and celebrated their stories of hope in the morning. By the afternoon Watoto fever had spread throughout the school and the evening performance was filled with members of our community and our young people.



Showjumping Champion Abi Phillips from Year 9 represented the school in the British National Schools Showjumping Competition, winning the 90 cm event. She regularly competes in prestigious competitions, including the Royal Welsh Show.



Kick Boxing Champion Victoria Perkins in Year 7 won the British Title Under 45 kilos in kick boxing.

#### WELSH BACCALAUREATE

As part of their Welsh Baccalaureate, Year 10 pupils are undertaking several global awareness and community challenges. One group has presented a series of assemblies for Years 7 to 10, raising awareness of global poverty. Their teacher Miss Jones said "The response from staff and their fellow pupils has been absolutely superb. Not only have they been able to spread a powerful message, they also managed to have an impact on the education of children from Nepal. It is amazing that pupils previously raised £1,000 by doing a charity hike up Pen Y Fan. This was donated to the Mahendra Jyoti School which had been destroyed by last year's earthquake. The pupils have received letters of thanks from the Nepalese head teacher along with photos showing the devastation and now the rebuild of their school. "



Another Welsh Bac group is delivering a cookery course where they teach pupils from the school's ASD Unit. They meet the pupils during weekly lunch time sessions and everyone thoroughly enjoys learning new skills. These are budding young teachers who are sharing their own skills with fellow pupils at the school. They have linked their work to other community activities and will be selling the product of their endeavours in the charity Car Boot Sale to be held on 9th July.

# Pupils prove their strength in numbers

The Mathematics Department entered 22 pupils from Year 10 and 28 pupils from Year 9 for the 2016 Intermediate Mathematics Challenge. The challenge is a national competition run by the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust to identify the top mathematicians in the country.

From a national entry of over 200,000 pupils, only the top 6% receive gold certificates, the next 13% receive silver awards and the following 21% receive bronze awards.

The school's pupils were very successful, gaining 1 gold, 5 silver and 5 bronze awards.

## ART /CELF

An exhibition was held at the end of June in the Grand Theatre showcasing some of the best pieces of GCSE and A-level work produced this year. Neath Port Talbot LA had teamed up with Swansea and each school chose their three top final pieces of work for the exhibition. #### **RAF ROADSHOW**

Year 9 pupils were mesmerized by an RAF presentation recently. 'Fun with Flight' was a 50-minute jet fuelled presentation exploring the physics of flying. Students discovered how the physics they study in the classroom is an integral part of the work that engineers undertake in the RAF and other engineering organisations.

Some of the exciting demonstrations included drones, balloons, airships and even jet engines. They enjoyed learning about the microlight world altitude record and the physics behind how the RAF achieved their

goal. Pupils even got to try out new virtual reality equipment - which frightened everyone!

The Roadshow was devised in response to the Government's acknowledgement that there is already a shortfall of 'home grown' scientists and engineers to meet the needs of the country. By capturing the interest of young people aged 12 - 14, they can hopefully increase the numbers that take STEM subjects and ultimately increase the pool of talent in years to come.





#### **PEER MENTORS**

The peer mentors for 2016-17 were announced following a rigorous application and interview process which saw over 80 applicants. Forty Year 9 peer mentors have been appointed and they began their duties on Induction Day with the Year 6 pupils on Tuesday June 28th. They will receive a full day's training at the end of term as well as an opportunity to speak to previous peer mentors. Responsibilities will include offering support to new Year 7 pupils, being visible on the school yard at break times and also working with groups in the peer mentoring room at lunchtimes.

## **LESOTHO WALES LINK**

Design Technology teacher Victoria Ellis has just returned from a 6 month sabbatical to Lesotho run by the charity Dolen Cymru. She was volunteering in Paray High School, in the rural town of Thaba Tseka, teaching Home Economics, helping the teachers to introduce the new integrated curriculum and lecturing to trainee teachers in the Lesotho College of Education. It was a far cry from Cwmtawe - pupils were taught in classrooms with limited facilities and resources, and carried out manual labour every day. Many children were orphans, food was often limited due to the current drought situation and with the HIV rate at 24%, every day was a challenge. Despite these difficulties the children were so happy and keen to learn. They were incredibly grateful for the stationery that Cwmtawe had donated to them, they couldn't believe that they were allowed to keep it and were proud to bring it to their lessons. Cwmtawe is now linked with Paray and it is hoped that the pupils from both schools will communicate with each other and share experiences of their lives and help develop their knowledge of Global Citizenship.
