It was a wonderful day, demonstrating the community's support to the school on what turned out to be one of the wettest days of the Summer. There was fun for the whole family and the pupils are to be congratulated for their hard work. This week pupils have met with representatives from Macmillan to present them with their donation of £5,500. They worked with a team of staff who cycled around Wales to raise this substantial amount of money.



On the weekend of 2nd July, the pupils made the journey to climb Snowdon, the highest mountain in Wales, as part of a fundraiser for both the Amanda Hodson Pupil Welfare Fund and Macmillan Cancer Charity. The total amount raised was £11,000 which was shared between the two charities. They stayed overnight in Jesse James' Bunkhouse where they were able to watch Wales' epic win over Belgium in the Euros. This put them in good spirits to climb Snowdon in its full glory. It was a glorious day and they were able to see Snowdon at its very best, although it was very cold and misty at the top! Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the very tiring climb and returned home unscathed.

HISTORY AND DRAMA / HANES A DRAMA

The Drama and History Departments organised a day trip to the Dylan Thomas Theatre in Swansea to watch a play called 'The Ghost of Morfa Colliery'. The production told the story of an explosion at the Morfa Colliery in Taibach, Port Talbot which killed 87 miners in 1890.

That day, 450 men should have been at work but something kept 200 of them at home. In the inquest, there were accounts of ghostly apparitions and unearthly voices heard weeks before the explosion.

This gothic story told the tale of the young children who worked underground during the Victorian era. Pupils were introduced to the lives of ordinary people living through extraordinary times, through the struggle, sacrifice and hardship.

After the production, pupils attended the Swansea & National Waterfront Museums. At each museum they participated in various activities designed to further enhance their knowledge and understanding of life in the Victorian era.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY / SUL Y COFIO

Armistice Day was commemorated by a traditional two minute silence and pupils also created a display made of poppies in the school foyer. Thought provoking assemblies were held for all year groups during the week and pupils took part in a ceremony in the centre of Pontardawe, laying a wreath on behalf of the school.

GIRLS FOOTBALL TEAMS / TIMAU PEL-DROED MERCHED






KEY STAGE 4 PASTORAL DAY / DIWRNOD BUGEILIOL

Skill Days Bridge the Gap with Primary Schools

Years 5 and 6 in the Cwmtawe cluster of schools enjoyed action packed days in November when they joined us for our Sports Skills Day and Technology Skills Day.

Sports Skills Day consisted of an exciting range of games and activities including rugby, racquet skills and basketball courtesy of the physical education department and our Sports Ambassadors. It was a welcome taster of PE and games lessons at Cwmtawe School.

On Technology Skills Day pupils studied aeroplane design. Divided into mixed teams, pupils designed and constructed their aeroplanes and then competed to see which ones flew most effectively.

Cwmtawe holds several skills days for Year 6 pupils throughout the academic year as part of its primary school transitional programme. These days give pupils a chance to experience the varied curriculum at the school, including ICT, music, sports and technology, leading to an induction day in the Summer. The events also serve to build relationships and team building skills between pupils of different schools before they join as next year's Year 7. The skills days are incredibly successful at easing pupils into life at Cwmtawe and are some of the most eagerly anticipated events in our school calendar.



WORK RELATED EDUCATION / ADDYSG GYRFAOEDD

Year 10 pupils were involved in a range of work-related activities during the Summer term to enhance their awareness of post-16 choices.

Representatives from a range of organisations including Swansea University, BT, Wales Air Ambulance, Careers Wales and the Army visited the school throughout the week. Ex-pupil Craig Jarrett, Food and Beverage Director of Royal Caribbean International, visited the school to provide a fascinating insight into the range of employment opportunities available on board cruise ships. Canadian professional ice-skater and Disney on Ice entertainer Jean-Simone Legare talked to pupils about his career in sport and the entertainment industry.

The Neath College Work-Based Learning team gave a series of talks on apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities and a group of pupils paid a visit to the Sandfields Young Business Centre in Port Talbot to explore enterprise.

Pupils with an interest in medicine attended talks and workshops on respiratory physiology, medical physics and nursing which were delivered by staff from the School of Medicine at Swansea University.

Pupils participated in workshops delivered by local entrepreneurs including One Heart Drummers, ex-pupil dance teacher Hannah May, ex-Rugby player Duncan Jones, Ski Academy and a team of successful business people from Big Ideas Wales.

Pupils developed their first aid skills with a team of local paramedics and tried their hand at using construction simulator equipment provided by the 'Have a Go' team at Neath College.

GCSEPOD / CODENTGAU

Continuing our support for all pupils, the school now has an account with GCSEPod which is a stimulating resource to encourage and develop learning outside lessons, particularly those in Years 10 and 11 who are preparing for their GCSE examinations. It can be accessed on the internet through FROG on the school's home page or by downloading an appropriate app for your devices. There are over 3,500 audio-visual podcasts which can be watched on mobile devices, tablets and PCs.

It is designed to squeeze exactly the right knowledge you need for exam success into short 3-5 minute chunks.

The site can also help with learning, homework and revision.

GCSEPod podcasts are designed for mobile devices so it's like carrying a huge pile of textbooks and revision guides around with you everywhere. It explains everything clearly and precisely with accurate facts, quotes, keywords, dates and annotated diagrams on screen.

Pupils won't need to use it for long before they feel the impact. It has been proven that consistent use in just 10 minute chunks support achievement, right up to A*.













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
