YOUTH COUNCIL / CYNGOR IEUENCTID

New Year 10 pupils visited Borth for 2 days of coastal fieldwork as part of their GCSE Geography studies. The group investigated a range of coastal landforms and processes and looked at Borth's coastal defence scheme.



MATHEMATICS / MATHEMATEG UK Junior and Intermediate Mathematics Challenge

The UK Mathematics Trust is a registered charity whose aim is to advance the education of children and young people in mathematics. It organises national mathematics competitions for UK secondary school pupils.

The mathematics department entered thirty pupils from Year 11, ten pupils from Year 10, and ten pupils from Year 9 for the 2017 Intermediate Mathematics Challenge. For the Junior Mathematics Challenge the department entered thirty Year 8 pupils and twenty Year 7 pupils. The challenge is a national competition run by the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust to identify the top mathematicians in the country.

From a national entry of over 250,000 pupils for each challenge, only the top 6% receive Gold certificates, the next 13% receive Silver awards and the following 21% receive Bronze awards.

The school's pupils were very successful gaining 2 Gold, 12 Silver and 17 Bronze awards. The successful candidates were:-

Cwmtawe pupils thoroughly enjoyed the performance, with pupils soaking up the tremendous energy exuberated by these young children and over £2,700 was raised.

'LITTER LESS' COMPETITION SUCCESS

Cwmtawe pupils recently entered a Young Reporters for the Environment Competition, entitled 'Litter Less' in association with Keep Wales Tidy. The competition focused on drawing attention to the increasing problem of litter within our society. A selection of Year 11 pupils and some of the school's new Senior Prefect Team entered newspaper articles in the nationwide competition. The articles had to be fair, balanced and contain objective reporting - as well as being informative and well researched. Cwmtawe's entries focused on the litter situation in school and the surrounding local area - but also linked these issues to a wider global context.

Another feature of the competition was that the articles had to be disseminated to an audience through a number of channels and this was done through Twitter, via communal plasma screens and by articles being used as stimulus materials with some Year 8 classes. Furthermore, the articles will also feature in this Autumn's edition of Tawe Times, the school's annual pupil magazine. Impressively, Year 10 pupil Libby O'Sullivan's entry came runner-up for the whole of Wales and she was awarded £50. As a winner, she also got to attend the famous Volvo Ocean Race Summit when it stopped off in Cardiff on the 5th June to receive her prize. As an Eco-School, Cwmtawe also sent a larger pupil delegation to the 'Big School's Day' event at the summit and the delegates had a great day out whilst completing activities and attending workshops that focused on raising awareness on how we can improve ocean health.





DRAMA

On June 4th, pupils performed a play called "Chicken" by Mark Wheeler to local councillors, the local Police Sargeant and PCSOs. On the following evening they performed in front of parents and the local community.

"Chicken" tells the story of two cousins, Tammy and Chris. The play explores their close relationship and their passion for cycling, along with promoting the strong message of road safety for cyclists. However, one fateful morning the cousins walk to school and there is a tragic accident following a reckless game of "Chicken." As one of the cousins dies the audience is left wondering how the other will be able to live with this dreadful secret.

Pupils also enjoyed watching a performance of this moving play in assemblies during the following week. The performance was filmed and will be used next year during Year 7 pastoral lessons to inform and teach pupils about road safety.

Responsibilities will include offering support to new Year 7 pupils, being visible on the school yard at break times and also working with groups in the peer mentoring room at lunchtimes.
